APPENDIX A

COUNTY REPORT – Cllr Carl Maynard

As we move out of COVID restrictions I thought it would be timely to inform residents of some of our live environmental projects throughout the county

As schools and staff gradually return to normal, we anticipate an increase in energy usage and carbon emissions compared with last year. Projects underway in 2021/22 to reduce ESCC's carbon emissions include:

- Conversion of 14,000 streetlights to low energy LEDs.
- Completion of the delivery of the £480K of government-funded energy efficiency projects in 2022, including a whole building retrofit and pilot installation of heat pumps in a primary school.
- Installation of low energy LED lighting and solar panels in at least 6 sites.
- Implementation of the Council's Electric Vehicle Strategy.
- Continue to deliver the communications plan to Members and staff.
- Continue to embed carbon reduction into appropriate procurement contracts, for example in the new highways contract.
- Update the staff travel plan alongside the Future Workstyles review.

We are not standing still waiting for central government instructions; these are live projects getting improvements delivered now!

<u>APPENDIX B</u>

Proposal to form a Guestling Community Interest Company

Situation

The 1066 Country Walk Hastings Link footpath runs through ancient woodland on land to the north of the carriageway of Church Lane from the Village Hall to St Laurence Church. This land, known as Beech Walk, is owned by East Sussex County Council (ESCC) as part of the highway and is currently unmaintained. The trees are subject to a Tree Preservation Order. In several parts these trees need management. The right of way needs work to reinforce two sections that have slipped. The whole area will need management going forward.

The management of this land does not fall within the current ESCC Highways operational plan. The only ESCC commitment to the land, other than ownership, is regular inspection of the footpath by the Rights of Way Team under their agreement with Rother District Council (RDC).

Community Interest

The proposal is for the Parish Council (GPC) in partnership with the Parochial Church Council (PCC) to form a Community Interest Company (CIC) to work with ESCC to manage the land to ensure the maintenance of the footpath and the health of the ancient woodland strip along its length to bring back its use as a community path to and from the Church and Village Hall.

Structure

A CIC is a special type of limited company which exists to benefit the community rather than private shareholders.

The members of the company would be GPC and the PCC. The ex officio directors of the company would be found from members of GPC and the PCC. It is proposed that initially there should be two directors from GPC and two from the PCC.

Purpose

The CIC would plan and manage the maintenance of Beech Walk. It would agree the plans with ESCC and RDC and find the funds either in money or volunteer time to carry out the programme of works. The aim of the CIC is the preservation of the character and function of Beech Walk as a community asset, safe for use by the community and visitors alike.

Funding

There are numerous funding and grant making bodies that provide resources for work of this kind that can be accessed by charitable organisations. The CIC is a charitable organisation: the directors are unpaid and any profit, were there ever to be any, can only be re-invested into the work of the CIC. The directors are responsible for reporting on the work and for publishing the annual accounts. CICs are registered with the Regulator of Community Interest Companies.
